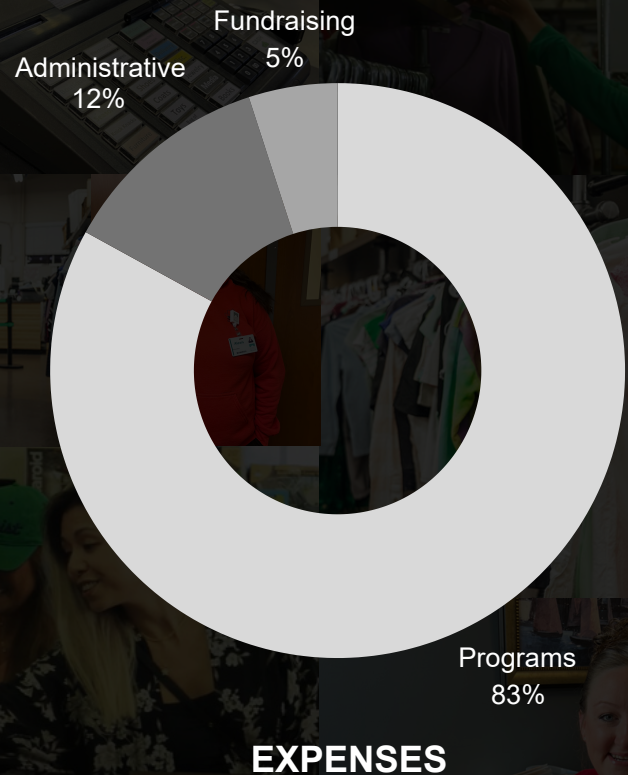
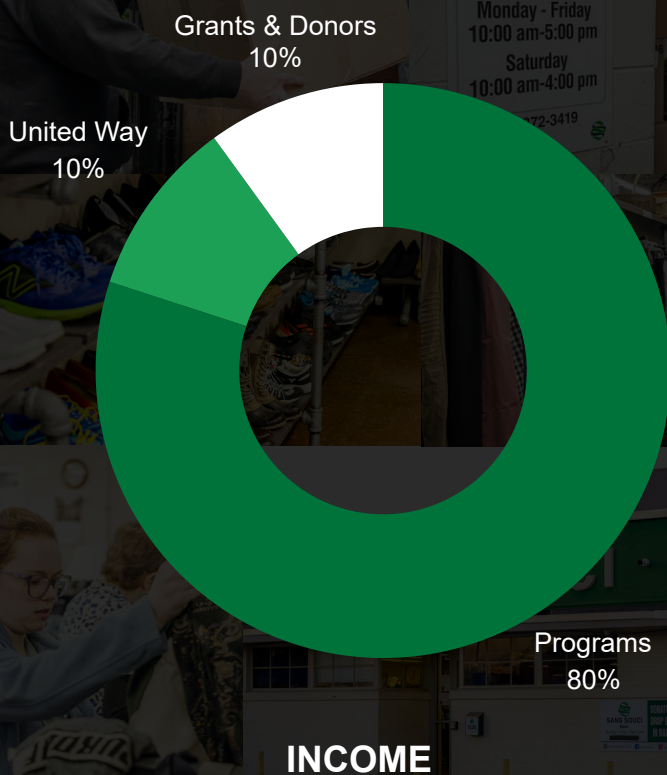


SANS SOUCI ANNUAL REPORT 2023
